

Despite the relatively drab July weather, I will start on a positive note, I am happy to report that the Bar and

Catering (B&C) service is currently on track to reverse the historical annual losses into a surplus for this coming year. This piece of good news prompted me to provide you with a backdrop of the challenges that the hospitality sector faces and what we are doing at the club to address the ongoing situation.

The combined factors of the rising cost of utilities, the staffing crisis and the spiralling wholesale cost of food and drink prices have created unprecedented levels of pressure on Bar and Catering services. A recent article in a Sunday supplement highlighted that since the pandemic, the cost of eating out has increased by an average of 30%!

So, what are we meant to do to combat these issues? Do we simply 'absorb' the increases and lose money, or do we address the decline, and if so, then how?

In terms of energy costs, our current tariff is about to expire, and I know that Nes has spent a great deal of time and effort in trying to obtain a better deal from all the available energy suppliers. The prospect of leaner and greener forms of energy is also being explored. In the meantime, we are diligent in ensuring that we are reducing the use of energy by not leaving electrical units, such as the exhaust fans running when there is no food service. As members, we can also play our part, by switching off any unnecessary lighting that you may see switched on during the day. Sometimes it's the small things.



The staffing crisis is causing major problems for virtually every hospitality outlet in the UK, not only in the resourcing of competent people, but also the challenges of retaining existing staff. We are blessed to have a happy and functioning team that provides a quality service (although there is always room for improvement). However, we must not be complacent, and we will remain alive to market forces to ensure that we retain our current team. The hospitality industry has, for decades, undervalued many of its staff – something that we at OGC must not allow to happen. I am acutely aware that the implications of not retaining staff will have a detrimental effect on the quality and levels of service – a situation that I am determined to avoid!

Rising wholesale food and beverage costs are a major problem for all clubs, and one that affects every single member to a greater or lesser degree. This is a topic that I will cover in the August Newsletter To finish on a positive note and from a personal perspective, the course is currently in such great condition. This fact is also reflected in the very positive comments and praise that I regularly hear from the members, visiting societies and other guests. So, a well-deserved thank you to all of the catering team for all of your ongoing hard work. It is very much appreciated by all.

### **Quick Tips**

Everyone tends to automatically open the clubface when trying to play a greenside bunker shot, but if you are struggling to make a consistent strike try the following set up and practice drill. You can always introduce an open clubface for more delicate shots later.

- 1. Set up in the bunker with a square stance and clubface and without a ball
- 2. Make a few normal swings completing your follow through and imagining the sand being hit out of the bunker onto the green
- 3. You should start to notice that the impact or 'sand divot' is somewhere between the centre of you stance and your left foot (right foot for left handers)
- 4. Make note of the position of the centre of this 'sand divot' and that is where you should have your ball positioned when playing a bunker shot. It will normally be around the instep or big toe on your left foot.
- 5. Use a ball now and set up with a square stance keeping the ball in the new position.
- 6. Swing as before trying to complete your follow through and hit the sand out of the bunker onto the green
- 7. Voila!
