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Chairperson's Report

Summer has arrived in all its glory and the course is holding up well in the baking sunshine. Ian and his team have clearly put the greens into top gear with dreaded de-greening now a real threat on several holes. Fortunately, the condition of the greens has ensured consistency and true-running, so we only have ourselves to blame...

The management committee met on 3rd of June. The finalised accounts for the year were presented and are in line with what I summarised in the last newsletter. These will be tabled at the upcoming Annual General Meeting which has been scheduled for Wednesday 6th August at 7pm; please do come along if you are able as we will both be explaining the numbers and talking about our approach to managing the club's finances over the next few years. Nes Reed will be distributing the accounts by email prior to the meeting.

The Greens Committee gave their usual comprehensive update. The Accessibility initiative has been a success, with over £5,500 having been raised against a target of £5,000. Materials are now being sourced for the installation of hand-rails and this, together with a less steep re-routing of the pathway from the 2nd tee-box and improvement of the steps down to the 18th green are hoped to be complete by calendar year-end. The money raised is going this far due to the commitment of our excellent volunteers who will be doing much of the work – our sincere thanks in advance to these stalwarts who make such a difference to a club with a small membership. (You may have noticed the new lean-to shed being built next to the greenskeeping shed; another example of volunteer work making a big difference.)

Among the other items covered by the Greens Committee was the 4th fairway tree-line project. With money raised from the Captain's Charity and a contribution from the Senior's Open we are close to meeting the funding target. Fingers crossed and we should see some very visible improvement there in the not-too-distant future.

Ian and his team are also looking to the future and what can be done to improve a number of the tee-boxes and enhance drainage on the more affected greens. Success here would mean fewer mats and temporary greens in play over the winter, so we will do what we can to support those efforts.

On membership and marketing, I am happy to report that this year is looking solid on renewals and new members. Additionally, we are off to a good start on visitor greens fees with April being comfortably ahead of budget. Social events have been going well, and on that subject please keep in mind our Women's Captain's Day on 8th July and Men's Captain's Day on 25th July.

Dave Moreland, our pro, also attended the meeting to update the committee on his area and in particular to let us know about his plans, with the help of Michael Davidson, to enhance the junior membership activities of the club. More on that later in the year.



I mentioned our volunteers earlier. One post we will be looking to fill soon is for oversight and guidance on our health and safety obligations. If you feel that you could help with this, please let Nes know. Prior knowledge of health and safety matters would be helpful but is not necessary. And this is a role that will be covered by our volunteers scheme (please see the email of 4th June "Your Golf Club Needs You!").



Hi everyone



The tees are one area where I would like them to be better than they are, but next spring you will all see a massive improvement in them which will elevate the course to a higher level. Exciting times.

Regarding tees, the new world handicap system means you have a maximum of 10 metres in front and 10 metres behind the tee distance posts per tee with a overall distance of no more or less than 100 metres over the whole course. With our course being over 100 years old the maximum distance is reduced because most of the distance posts are at the back of the tees already. This gives us a very small footage area to use leading to worn out tees, the future and answer to this would be to widen and not lengthen tees and is something that from now on will be looked at so we can not only have a qualifying course all year round but protect and spread the wear to the tees.

The greens are nearly where I want them to be. As I write this, the greens today are stimping (method of collecting data as to how the greens are performing) at 11.0, which is well above member clubs levels. What we are achieving though is not at the detriment to the welfare if the greens good cultural practices like aeration proper controlled year round feeding and moisture management etc allows us to produce the surfaces you are now getting with it being sustainable though to do so.

The 15th green has now got the go ahead to be drained, this will be started on the week commencing the 8th

September. The work should be done within two days and back in play a couple of days later. I'm really looking forward to the results and being able to keep it open throughout the winter, with it being one of if not the driest greens on the course, first step in us getting away from temp greens during the winter.

Staff v club match is on the 4th July. This is our fourth match since we introduced it with the staff winning two and a draw in the other one. Looking at our team the club best get some more practice in! Lol!


